
Just Results

In May 2012 MJW brought together 30 leading experts to explore in an open-minded and constructive spirit the challenges of applying PbR to the delivery of community sentences. Participants also focused on ways in which such challenges could be overcome. *Just Results* captured the outcomes of the event – facilitated by independent public service experts - and identified nine key operating principles which must be in place if PbR is to be a success.

MJW outlined serious concerns about the use of PbR in community sentencing.

 The MOJ had not given themselves enough time to run the pilots (these have since been cancelled completely).

Out in the Open

In June 2012 MJW and <u>Victim Support</u> set out to examine victims' awareness and perceptions of community alternatives to custody, and to test how they respond to knowing more about them.

The report was released in September 2012, MJW and <u>Victim Support</u> found that if victims are given more information about community sentences then they become more confident in their effectiveness. MJW and Victim Support also jointly presented reports at all three Party Conferences.

Right on Crime

In August 2012 MJW gave a grant journalist Ian Birrell to travel to the United States to investigate the <u>'Right on Crime</u> <u>'</u>movement, which originated in Texas and is now spreading across America.

Some prominent US conservatives have declared prison a failure. It is expensive and has few - if any - positive outcomes for lower level, repeat offenders particularly those who have drug and alcohol issues.

The Observer article revealed that investing in rehabilitation (which costs less than prison), effective sentencing and support for offenders has had a dramatic effect on reoffending rates in Texas and has already led to the closure SOHO44 and £10. Matrix

In June 2012 research commissioned by Make Justice Work into the economic benefits of providing Intensive Alternatives to Custody (IAC order) instead of short term custodial sentences revealed they could save up to £500 million over five years. These total savings are broken down as follows: £177 million in reduced intervention costs, £69 million in reduced costs to the criminal justice system of dealing with crimes, £29 million in reduced costs to the NHS of dealing with crimes and £225 million in reduced costs to the victims of crimes.

Research practice at <u>Matrix Knowledge Group</u> conducted the research using the example of IAC orders in two pilot sites in Manchester and Bradford.
