MJW October Newsletter



Last week at the Conservative Party Conference, the new Secretary of State for Justice, the Rt. Hon. Chris Grayling MP, laid out his plans for prisons and community sentencing (<u>read the speech here</u>). He called for 'tougher sentences' with a punitive element included in every community sentence.

Following the suspension of the two planned Payment by Results community sentencing pilots, there are rumours that the Government may now attempt to roll out this radical new delivery system without prior testing. In the light of our recent report – 'Just Results'- we would view this prospect with grave misgivings

Our recent research with Victim Support shows that victims of lower level crime see both punishment and rehabilitation as key functions of a community sentence that must be included to reduce reoffending. MJW will continue to campaign to improve public and governmental awareness of the rehabilitative benefits of community sentences versus short-term prison sentences.

Out in the Open

On 17 September MJW and Victim Support launched a join report 'Out in the Open: What victims really think about community sentencing'.

The key findings were that victims, whilst broadly open to the use of community sentences, wanted reassurance about their effectiveness in practice. Action is needed to improve victims' awareness and understanding of community sentences and to give victims a voice in

'Right on Crime'

MJW recently enabled journalist Ian Birrell to travel to the United States to investigate the 'Right on Crime' movement, which originated in Texas and is now spreading across America.

Some key US conservatives have declared prison a failure, that is expensive and has few - if any - positive outcomes for lower level, repeat offenders.

The article, (<u>The Observer 30/09/2012</u>) recently published in The Observer, revealed that investing in rehabilitation (which costs less than prison), effective sentencing and support for offenders has had a dramatic effect on reoffending rates in Texas and has even led to the closure of prisons in some states.

MJW Written Evidence to the Justice Select Committee Inquiry on Women Offenders

Last month MJW submitted written evidence to the Justice Select Committee Inquiry on women offenders. We remain deeply disappointed by the lack of progress in reducing the number of women in custody and recommend that there should be a greater use of intensive community punishments for lower-level female offenders. Steps must also be taken to increase awareness amongst the judiciary of the special needs of female offenders. At the same time, the government must put safeguards in place to ensure that the needs of women offenders are not brushed aside following the adoption of Payment by Results in community sentencing.
